## AUTUMN SHOW

The Large Village Hall will be open for entries from 10 am .
All entries must be staged by 11.30 am when judging will commence and members, unless authorised by the committee, are asked to keep away from the exhibits.
Competitors should use their numbers, as explained in the Rules.
Non-members will be issued temporary numbers.
Open to the public at 2.30 pm . Prizes at 4 pm .

## Rules and Conditions of Entry for Shows

1) Every Society member will be allotted a number for the show. Non-members will be issued temporary numbers.
2) All exhibits must be grown on ground in exhibitor's possession, or in the case of plants for a period of at least 3 months. This does not apply to Floral Arrangements, Home Produce, and Handicrafts sections.
3) Number of each kind of vegetable and fruit to be used in the 'Collections':
4 Potatoes, 3 Onions, 3 Leeks, 6 Pods of Peas, 2 Parsnips, 3 Carrots, 3 Turnips, 5 Shallots, 3 Tomatoes, 6 Brussels Sprouts, 2 Cauliflowers, 2 Cabbage (Red), 2 Cabbage (Green), 2 Lettuce, 2 Cucumbers, 2 Marrows, 2 Heads of Celery, 3 Beetroot, 6 Broad Beans, 6 French Beans, 6 Runner Beans, 5 Courgettes, 10 Radishes. Herbs may be used for decoration only.
For more details see the RHS Show handbook held by the WGS Chair.
4) For the 'Collections' of distinct types of vegetables in the Summer and Autumn Shows the maximum marks for each kind of vegetable will be those laid down by the Royal Horticultural Society in their guide for the judging of vegetables. Details may be obtained from the WGS Chair on request. The size of 'Collections' is not to exceed 20 "x 24 "/ 50 x 60 cm .

5a) Plates will be provided for exhibits but you may use your own for the home produce classes. 5b) Vases will be provided and must be used for flowers where listed in the schedule.
5c) Floral arrangements in your own choice of container.

5d) Jars and bottles in the Home Produce Section should be made of clear glass and be free from all commercial trademarks, whether on lid or jar. They should bear a label clearly denoting the contents and date made.
5e) The width of a bowl should be greater that its height.
6) The Committee appoint judges who have no right to compete in any entry.
7) Judges may decide whether an exhibit in a class is worthy of a prize. Where a trophy or other award is offered for the best exhibit in a class, section or the whole show, the judges may make a recommendation and the Committee reserves the right to make a final decision. Judging will be in accordance with the Royal Horticulture Society Rules, except for ‘Collections'.
8) Exhibits will be disqualified in any class if the numbers of each kind, or the variety or the quantity used are not exactly as shown in this schedule. The judges are encouraged to leave helpful comments about exhibits
9) The Committee reserve the right to make alterations relating to the Show which they think desirable, before the day of the Show.
10) The Committee will not accept responsibility for any loss or damage to any exhibit or container, but all possible care will be taken to avoid loss or damage.
11) Trophies awarded for one year at the Show must be returned in good condition to the Society one week before the appropriate Show the next year. The Hayes Cup must be returned at each show.
12) Only members of Wye Gardeners' Society will be eligible for the Summer, Autumn and Annual Awards. At each show 1st, 2nd and 3rd prize winners will be awarded 3,2 and 1 points respectively to be used in calculating these awards. In the event of a tie the award will go to the competitor with the most 1st prizes in that Category.
13) No exhibit may be removed until after the prize giving.
